## Introduction

This Japanese Industrial Standard has been prepared based on the first edition of **ISO 22300** published in 2012 without any modifications of the technical contents.

The portions with dotted underlines are the matters not given in the corresponding International Standard.

## 1 Scope

This Standard contains terms and definitions applicable to societal security to establish a common understanding so that consistent terms are used.

NOTE : The International Standard corresponding to this Standard and the symbol of degree of correspondence are as follows:

ISO 22300:2012 *Societal security—Terminology* (IDT)

The symbols which denote the degree of correspondence in the contents between the relevant International Standard and **JIS** are IDT (identical), MOD (modified), and NEQ (not equivalent) according to **ISO/IEC Guide 21-1**.

## 2 Terms and definitions

### 2.1 Societal security

#### 2.1.1 societal security

protection of society from, and response to, incidents, emergencies and disasters caused by intentional and unintentional human acts, natural hazards, and technical failures

#### 2.1.2 stakeholder

person or group of people that holds a view that can affect the organization

#### 2.1.3 societal security framework

set of components that provide the foundations and organizational arrangements for designing, implementing, monitoring, reviewing and continually improving societal security

NOTE 1 The foundations include the policy, objectives, mandate and commitment to manage societal security.

NOTE 2 Organizational arrangements include plans, relationships, accountabilities, resources, processes and activities.

#### 2.1.4 civil protection

measures taken and systems implemented to preserve the lives and health of citizens, their properties and their environment from undesired events

NOTE : Undesired events can include accidents, emergencies and disasters.
